THE PHILIPPINE EDUCATIONAL SYSTEM





The Philippine educational system is composed of two major subsystems, the formal and the non-formal.







FORMAL SUBSYSTEM

- Consists of *sequential* academic schooling at several levels
- Provides students with **basic skills** of numeracy and functional literacy and grants certifications of proficiency in different academic disciplines.







NON-FORMAL EDUCATION

 May be described as any organized and systematic learning conducted largely
 outside the formal educational subsystem that may or may not provide certification.







NON-FORMAL EDUCATION

• At present, non-formal education in the Philippines has four thrusts:

- 1. family life skills, including health, nutrition, childcare, household management, and family planning;
- 2. vocational skills;
- 3. functional literacy;
- 4. livelihood skills







• The Education for All (EFA) movement of UNESCO gave the nonformal education subsystem its greatest boost. It served as a powerful impetus and support for those engaged in non-formal education to meet the basic literacy needs of all children, youth and adults.

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• 1997: the Department of Education, Culture, and Arts, now known as the Department of Education (DepEd) created Memorandum No. 216, known as the Home Education Program.





- 2004: under the Executive Order No. 356, the Bureau of Non-formal Education is renamed to Bureau of Alternative Learning System (BALS).
 - 1. Ensure the expansion of access to educational opportunities for citizens of different interests, capabilities, demographic characteristics and socio-economic origins and status; and
 - Promote certification and accreditation of alternative learning programs both formal and informal in nature for basic education.





HOMESCHOOLING

• An Alternative Delivery Mode (ADM) that aims to provide learners with access to quality basic education through a homebased environment to be facilitated by qualified parents, guardians or tutors who have undergone relevant training.



MODULAR DISTANCE LEARNING

• Involves individualized instruction that allows learners to use self-learning modules (SLMs) in print or digital format/electronic copy.





ONLINE DISTANCE LEARNING

• The teacher as facilitator, engages the learners' active participation through the use of various technologies accessed through the internet while they are geographically remote from each other during instruction.







ONLINE DISTANCE LEARNING







BLENDED LEARNING

• A learning delivery that combines faceto-face with any or a mix of online distance learning, modular distance learning, and TV/Radio-based Instruction.



- Some provide Grade level kits (Preselected from different publishers).
- Textbooks were prescribed to parents, but they have the freedom to use other materials for their child's learning interest as long as it is aligned to the DepEd's K to12 competencies.







- Books and modules can be availed on the school.
- Schools which provides modules also provides answer keys and grading sheets.







Some schools also provide e-learning materials such as e-books, e-modules, supplementary videos etc.


• Some also provide lesson plans which the parents can follow.

- Parents as primary teachers.
- → Parents/Families were provided with seminars/trainings.

 \rightarrow It will be up to the parents to create the schedules and teach their children according to the curriculum.








• Parents as primary teachers.

→ Parent monitor the progress of the child, check their tasks and exam, and records their scores. (Master Record Sheet, Student Progress Report, and an Academic Record card)







• Parents as primary teachers.

→ Parent-teams provide tips and support to other parents and families







Teachers / Advisers

→ Commonly a teacher were assigned to support parents academically and emotionally, monitor and guide families.







• Teachers / Advisers

→ For students in higher grade levels, sessions with the school teacher were provided few days in a week for matrix subjects.





- Teachers / Advisers
- → Some schools also provide teachers assistance to lower levels for the subjects the parent can't teach.
- \rightarrow Teachers/Faculty assess the portfolios and grades of the child.

- Year-end portfolio submission.











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 Common assessments like quizzes and activity sheets are administered by parents. But there are some assessments like quarterly exams which are administered by the school coordinator/adviser.







HIGHLIGHTS OF HOMESCHOOLING ASSESSMENTS

- Integration is important
- Functionality of knowledge is emphasized.
- Unstructured activities are included in the formal assessment.
- Assessment are fluid and continuous.


ACADEMIC ACHIEVEMENT

• Homeschool students who take standardized tests usually do quite well when compared to traditionally-schooled peers as a group.





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SOCIAL DEVELOPMENT

• Homeschool children are not socially isolated







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SOCIAL ENGAGEMENT

• Homeschooling is likely to restructure the social world of the student, promoting more mixed-age than sameage engagements (Chatham-Carpenter 1994; Ensign 1997; Ray 2009a).







SOCIAL DEVELOPMENT

• Homeschoolers on average are engaged with persons from diverse socioeconomic backgrounds, ages, religions, and ethnicities (Medlin 1998, 2000).







SELF CONCEPT

• Researchers consistently find that on various measures of self-concept and self-esteem, homeschoolers score as well as or better than peers in other forms of schooling (Medlin 2000).
